It All Started in India - 1915

Creation of the Young Ismaili Vidhya Vinod Club (or V.V Club) of Bombay

Aim was to acquire knowledge and serve the Jamat

How It All Started - India



Pir Muhammed Madhani formed the first Ismaili Volunteer Corps. in Bombay on November 19, 1919.

He was appointed as a Captain in 1920, Chief Captain in 1931, Major in 1936.

In 1944 Mawlana Sultan Muhammed Shah appointed him as the Lt. Colonel of the Corps.

How It All Started - Africa




A.J. Lakhpati was one of the pioneers of the Ismaili Volunteer Corps in 1919 when he was the Vice Captain.

He later became a Major and helped establish the Ismaili Volunteer Corps in Kisumu, Kenya

How It All Started - 1920



- Mawlana Sultan Mohamed Shah Visited Bombay. The Volunteer Corps was on duty. He changed the name to H.H The Aga Khan Bombay Volunteer Corps
- The Imam granted them the "coat-ofarms" to be worn as part of the uniform.

How It All Started - 1921

Mawlana Sultan Mohamed Shah became the first Colonel of the Volunteer Corps and wore its uniform. He was colonel for 13 years.

"If you wish to serve, enroll yourselves in (this) Volunteer Corps; wear uniform and perform duty".



How The IVC Developed Its Mission - 1922

A riot broke up in Gujarat and the Ismaili Volunteer Corps responded by protecting the community.



How The IVC Developed Its Mission - 1927

The volunteers risked their lives and saved many lives during the torrential rains and floods in Gujarat.



How The IVC Developed Its Mission - 1929

Vice-Captain, A.J. Lakhpati fell seriously ill. It was decided by the doctors to treat him by blood transfusion. In those days, people had not heard of such a treatment. Therefore, they were scared. But, six young volunteers, without knowing the consequences, gave their blood to their Vice-Captain and saved his life.









IVC Timeline














Roles / Objectives


